On Saturday, May 17, Trinity members will gather for something special - a Great Day of Service!

We'll begin with a free pancake breakfast at 8:00 a.m. in Moor Hall and then we'll all head out to the various missions. There are opportunities for the entire family to be involved. Childcare will be provided for preschool age and younger (please make reservation by calling 222-1120).

Where will YOU serve? Here are the various opportunities:

Lee's Place: They are looking for a group to do inside and outside cleaning, yard work, washing windows, and outside pressure washing.

Hope Community: The group that goes to Hope Community will do some interior painting and some clean-up of inside and outside premises. Even though construction work is under way on one wing of the building, painting of interior halls, the laundry room and public areas may begin without interference. A team of 8-10+ volunteers, hopefully, will be able to complete most of this part of the painting that day. (See page 6 for more information on how to help Hope Community).

Chelsea House: A large group could help in various ways organizing cabinets; doing yard work; painting inside the home, gazebos, and the front and back porches; pressure washing; cleaning out a shed; and repairing an outside laundry room.

Second Harvest: On May 10th, Second Harvest will have their annual Post Office food drive, so on the 17th they can use as many as possible to sort all the food that was collected.

Allen Outreach: They need a small group to fix up a 10'x12' room, pulling up carpet, replacing windows, and painting.

Providence Neighborhood: Needs a few volunteers to distribute free bread, to do some light yardwork, and to pick up trash along a roadway.

The Cabin: (This is the Chelsea House store that takes in used items and then sells them to raise money). They could use a group to sort donations and do some clean-up around the property.

Grace Mission: They need a few individuals to deliver food in the neighborhood.

The Shelter: A group of ten or more could pick up trash around the Shelter and on the lot behind the building. Another group of five or six could come around 12:15 p.m. and bring ice cream and toppings to serve to the guests.

Around our church: Our Vacation Bible School is coming up and we'll be having a work day at the church to get ready. Also, our community garden on Duval can always use some attention. You can learn to make mats and knit hats for the homeless. The whole family can put together snack packs for HEO. There are a variety of other housekeeping, painting and repairs around the church that another group could do.

WAYNE'S WORDS

Dear Friends,

A book I pick up and re-read every once in a while is a book by Wayne Muller entitled, "Sabbath: Finding rest, renewal, and delight in our busy lives." It seems I always pick it up when I'm going through a hectic and busy time in my life and feel exhausted. It brings me back to what's really important...indeed essential...for a whole and healthy life.

How do I slow down? Is it really possible today to live a Sabbath kind of lifestyle? That's the question that I re-hash over and over again. Whether we're driven by the need to be accepted, a sense of guilt or just our personality-type, it's hard to slow down, isn't it? I'm reminded of something my driver's education teacher taught me back in 10th grade. The yellow light doesn't mean speed up - it means slow down. But the idea of yielding to the yellow lights of our lives doesn't get very good press these days.

The biblical sisters, Mary and Martha, can both teach us a lot about slowing down. When I read and re-read about Lazarus' two sisters, I come away with several feelings. Honestly, I relate to Martha. I know what it's like to be over busy, to be getting things in order, to wanting things just right. I also know what it feels like to get upset at everyone else for letting me do all the work. What parent hasn't complained when their fully-capable teenager watches them mow the lawn, wash the dishes, vacuum the floors- whatever! If my kids were sitting at the feet of Jesus, maybe I'd feel differently, but I doubt it.

I look in the mirror and I see Martha in me. I admire Martha. I want to be like Martha because everyone likes her hard work and ambition. She gets lots of compliments for doing such a good job-- for getting so much done. And that's the problem- that's why I have such a difficult time slowing down because I want everyone to feel like that about me too - you know - that I'm productive and slick and professional and really, really making a difference by everything that I'm involved with.

However, what I would like is to look in the mirror and see more of Mary in me. When you really think about it, it's quite foolish for me to be doing anything other than sitting with Jesus when He's around. But, when my mind plays forward to all that has to get done I miss the best part of life - enjoying the here



and now with the Lord.

I caught myself doing this the other day. I'm on email and I realize there's lots to get through. Then a friend walks into my office to talk. "I can't talk," I'm thinking. "Not now because I have to read and answer my emails" ... and one of them is from the very guy that is in my office. Isn't that ridiculous!? I feel like I don't have time for my friend in person because I have to respond to his email. I want to see Mary when I look in the mirror, I really do. I want to slow down.

Maybe you feel the same way. Maybe you're asking "yes, but how?" Perhaps that's the best place to start. As long as we develop a Sabbath attitude, I think that we can receive it as a gift. We shouldn't strive for Sabbath, or discipline ourselves into Sabbath or, Godforbid, become religious about Sabbath. Jesus said that the Sabbath was made for us, we weren't made for the Sabbath. In other words, we don't get stressed out and "serve" slowing down and resting...no, slowing down and resting is a "servant" to us.

So, take a breather with me. The world won't end if we slow down. Some things may seem to speed past us, but the one thing that really matters will be right there with us. His name is Jesus! Ask Mary ... all of you Marthas out there!

and enhancing the health of individuals through education, prevention and outreach.





City approves grant for Hope Community Families

Good news! The City of Tallahassee has approved Hope Community's proposal for a \$75,000 grant to renovate a dormitory, previously occupied by homeless men-only, to provide needed additional temporary emergency shelter for homeless families with small children. Construction is expected to commence early in May, pending permitting. The grant limits expenditures to partitioning of rooms, electrical, plumbing, HVAC and toilet facilities. This leaves much to be done to the interior to provide reasonable living accommodations for these families. Since 2012, Trinity members have remained committed to assisting Hope Community in providing safe, comfortable accommodations for family residents. That includes refurbishing the interior of two other dormitories for families and womenonly. Here are specifics of what is needed:

Volunteer Workers

A primary focus for Trinity's "Great Day of Service" on Saturday May 17th will be to provide volunteers for interior painting and some clean up of inside and outside premises. Even though construction work is under way on one wing of the building, painting of interior halls, the laundry room and public areas may begin without interference. A team of 8-10+

volunteers, hopefully, will able to complete most of this part of the painting that day.

Financial Needs

The total out-of-pocket cost of materials and equipment is approximately \$14,000. Approximately \$6,000 has been raised thus far from member contributions, and budgeted by the Local Missions Team. More current and product-specific prices on individual items have been obtained and are detailed as follows:

- 58 single mattresses with bed bug proof covers; cost \$110 each
- 4 automatic commercial grade washing machines: cost \$670 each
- 4 Automatic clothes dryers: \$570 each
- 12 small window blinds: cost \$32 each
- 2 large window blinds: cost \$71 each
- Public area furniture, 3 faux leather couches cost \$480 each
- One faux leather ottoman: cost \$240.
