Music News for September

Do you enjoy group activities? Do you enjoy making music? Do you enjoy being of service to your church? Great! We have a place for you in the music ministry at Trinity. Young children can participate in Cherub Choir as part of Sunday School. Older children (kindergarten through 5th grade) will really enjoy our NETkids program on Wednesday afternoons. We offer two choirs, an instrumental ensemble plus a lot of non-music activities. Parents, if your child wants to participate but needs transportation to the church, let me know. Youth Choir and Youth Praise Band will meet together this year on most Sundays, from 4:30 - 6 p.m. in the Underground.

Trinity Ringers (Wednesdays at 6:15 p.m.) and Jubilation Bells (Sundays at 6:15 p.m.) are handbell groups for adults. Heavenly Handchimes meets Thursdays at 1:45 p.m. and is for senior adults. 
of choices, so pick one or two and come join us! We give free tune-ups! Watch your bulletins or the church website to know when each group starts fall rehearsals after our summer break. By September 14, all music groups will be up and running. We hope you will be singing with us too!

Hymnal 101

Ever wonder what the numbers on the bottom of some hymn pages mean? Take "Holy, Holy, Holy" (hymn #64) for instance. On the bottom of the page, you will see 11 12. 12 10. Next Sunday when you are in the sanctuary, look on page 946 in the hymnal. You will notice the heading "METRICAL INDEX". Then turn to page 930 and near the top of the page in the center column you will find 11 12. 12 10. That is "Holy, Holy Holy", hymn #64. The numbers stand for the amount of syllables in each line or phrase of the hymn text. "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty" has 11 syllables. The next phrase "Early in the Morning our song shall rise to thee" has 12 syllables and so on. This was a way to categorize many hymns by the number of syllables per phrase. Sometimes a wellknown hymn tune can be paired with a

different hymn text provided they share the same metrical pattern. For instance, hymns #155, and #617 share the same metrical pattern as hymn #378, they can be sung to the hymn tune of #378.

Did you know that Trinity has AED machines? They are located on the second floor near the church office and another in the Welcome Center.

An automated external defibrillator (AED)

is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the life-threatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation and ventricular tachycardia in a patient and is able to treat them through defibrillation, the application of electrical therapy which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm.



With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the layperson, and the use of AEDs is taught in many first aid, certified first responder, and basic life support (BLS) level cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) classes.




Children's Stewardship

Quarterly Diaper Drive for Children's Home Society

The Local Missions Committee is sponsoring another quarterly diaper drive on Sunday September 11. This time, the agency receiving the diapers will be the **Children's Home Society of Florida**.

Children's Home Society of Florida works to protect and provide services for children, teens, and families. They help approximately 100,000 Florida children and families each year.

Through parent education, counseling, early education and care, in-home services, and connections to local resources, they help families learn to nurture their children to full potential.

They also help families raising children with developmental delays. Offering physical and speech therapy, nursing and medical services, counseling, and more, they help kids reach milestones while providing hope to the entire family.

They provide help to children who have been neglected or abused by providing emergency shelters or placing them in group homes; others join loving foster families and, for the first time, find acceptance and encouragement.

Through individual and family counseling, parents and children learn how to cope with stress, anger, discipline, depression, and other feelings and situations. As they help families stay safely together, bonds strengthen and trust builds.

When a child's own parents are unable to safely care for them, they find forever families eager to welcome them through

adoption. As Florida's most trusted adoption organization, they also find loving homes for infants through private adoption. They compassionately work with women facing unplanned pregnancies and provide confidential counseling, always keeping in mind the best interests of the child.

Teenagers in foster care who haven't found forever families receive help to develop selfsufficiency, responsibility and opportunities for life success. They provide life skills training, mentoring,

training, mentoring, educational and vocational coaching, and safe housing so teens don't have to face adulthood alone. Expectant and parenting teens learn positive parenting so they may become healthy, independent families.
