

Giving Thanks for the Hallow (the holy)

Several weeks ago we hosted the Young Adults for dinner at our home, and my wife Ramona had me bring out the orange storage bins that hold all of our fall, Halloween, and Thanksgiving decorations. Suddenly our home began to display hues of autumn colors in almost every room! We stopped by Gray Memorial UMC and purchased a pumpkin from their "Patch," supporting missions, and placed it on our front porch along with additional door decorations. Almost instantly a cold front passed through Tallahassee. Maybe pulling out the Halloween decorations encouraged the shift in the weather to cooler temperatures! Whatever the reason, we welcomed a change in the weather and the colors.

Hallow literally means to make holy or set apart for holy use. Halloween is a contraction of "All Hallows' Eve," an oldfashioned way of saying, "The Eve of All Saints' Day." Originally the end of October and the beginning of November was the time when the pagan Celts celebrated the end of their year. They believed that at that time the veil between this world and the next was very thin and that the dead came through to confront the living for good ... or evil. Some scholars believe that the Church, in order to counteract the pagan feast, introduced the Feast of All Saints, the day when all the triumphant dead in Christ would be commemorated and celebrated. No longer would the time be one of fear of death and the dead, but one of "rejoicing with the Saints in Light".

Various customs have developed related to Halloween. In the Middle Ages, poor people in the community begged for "soul cakes," and upon receiving these doughnuts, they would agree to pray for departed souls. This is the root of our modern day "trick-or-treat." The custom of masks and costumes developed to mock evil and perhaps confuse the evil spirits by dressing as one of their own. Bonfires and torches, even the burning of fields, were to scare away the evil spirits in the land and usher in a new planting season with a sense of preparation for the year ahead.

Some Christians visit cemeteries on Halloween, not to practice evil, but to commemorate departed relatives and friends, with picnics and the last flowers of the year. The day after All Saints day is called All Soul's Day (All Saints), a day to remember and offer prayers up on behalf of all faithful Christ followers. In many



cultures, these two days share a variety of customs and traditions.

As Christians, we can share what All Hallow's Eve (Halloween) is really about and witness to our faith in the "sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." We can tell others that as Christians that "we believe in the Communion of the Saints and the Life Everlasting," that those who have died in Christ are actually MORE alive than we, and pray with and for us.

Many churches have turned this season of Trick or Treating into a Fall Festival and provided safe and secure opportunities for children to have fun and enjoy this time with friends and family. Trinity's **First Love Fest** is happening on the eve of Halloween and we have unintentionally bumped up against Halloween with our own festival on Duval street right in front of the church!

As I am beginning to learn the history of our great church and its own Saints through the years, I am excited that we have the tradition of continuing to honor our loved one's in worship on our All Saints Sunday. We will remember those who this year, have gone before us, by reading their names and lighting a candle in their memory, as well as receiving a flower after communion to remind us of all those "Saints" that have in their living, touched our lives in significant ways!

I hope our All Saints Worship will be a meaningful time for you as you join me in remembering with Love and Thanksgiving the Saints in our lives who have shaped and molded us with their bold and faithful witness for Jesus Christ and his Church.



Have you ever thought of becoming a foster parent and don't know what to do or how to start the process. Well, you can reach out to Go Foster!

Go Foster! works to improve the lives of children in foster care by recruiting and retaining great foster families! They do this through four interrelated activities: RECRUIT, RETAIN, RESEARCH & REPEAT.

The GO FOSTER! Story

GOFOSTER! was founded by foster and adoptive parents Dr. Thomas Croom and Dr. Willy Bolander. With both of their homes largely at capacity with fostered and adopted children, Thomas and Willy came to the realization that they had nearly maxed-out the personal contribution they could make as individual foster families. Still wanting to improve the lives of children in care, they started looking for a new way to improve the foster care system.

"As a realistic starting point, the discussion focused on a single question: of all the areas that impact the overall quality of the foster care system, which can be changed with deliberate action? While some may want to improve certain aspects of case management agencies,

we really wouldn't expect that our efforts could make a significant impact on this



group since they are subject to so many constraints that cannot be lifted in the short term. Similarly, while we would love to address certain aspects of the legal system as it relates to child welfare, we cannot expect that our efforts to do so would produce immediate return for our effort. So Thomas and Willy identified an area where they knew they could have a strong, positive, and immediate impact – recruiting new foster families and supporting existing foster families (with the intent of retaining them longer).

Since we began operating throughout north Florida, we have seen scores of new foster families enter the foster system as a direct result of our efforts. We have also grown the number of families participating in our online and in-person support groups by over 20x and have seen over a hundred families participate in one of our events. Importantly, the large number of foster children placed with those families have found safe, loving homes with several achieving permanency through adoption. As a next step, we are seeking to deepen our effort in north Florida and begin expanding statewide."

Trinity Will Recognize Veterans Nov. 13

Trinity will look back into its own history November 13, when it recognizes veterans of World War II and the country's other military involvements of the past 70 years. Current Trinity members who have served in any of these wars are encouraged to attend morning worship that day to receive the appreciation of the congregation for their sacrifice.

Trinity's recently organized Historical Society will have displays in the Narthex telling the story of the church's experiences during World War II.

The 1940s were a challenging time for the pastor and congregation as eligible males fresh out of high school and older were drafted, trained for a few months, and shipped to battle in Europe, Africa, the South Pacific and other locales. The empty church pews soon were occupied by other mothers' sons stationed at Dale Mabry Field here in Tallahassee for flight training, or at Camp Gordon Johnston near Carrabelle to learn how to land on a beach under fire.

The Reverend Jack Anderson, who came to Trinity in 1939, and the church secretary, Mrs. Lynna Thompson, had a special way to make the servicemen feel at home. Each Sunday after the service, all would gather in front of the church for a group picture. These were sent to their families back home.

Rev. Anderson did even more for Trinity members and all Leon County men serving far from home. He sent a newsletter full of information about what was going on in Tallahassee, and about their families and their friends who were serving around the world. Hundreds of letters poured in marked "censored" and "postage free" from homesick servicemen, thanking the church for news from home.

The letters, in alphabetical order in a large scrapbook, may be viewed in the Narthex or later in the Heritage Room on the third floor of Trinity Hall. Also on display will be a bronze plaque listing the names of nine Trinity members who lost their lives during the war.

There will be uniforms of several branches of service, hats and other memorabilia. Historical Society officers invite persons who have uniforms from the service to add them to the display. Call Linda Yates (385-2768) if you have one to lend.
