# As we prepare to celebrate Epiphany on January 6, I wanted to share a true Epiphany Story that happened a number of years ago...

Most people know that United Methodist pastors move. When I was a child, I can remember our pastors moved every four years — just like clockwork. We loved getting to know all of our pastors. It was exciting when they came and sad when they moved. Until I became a pastor myself, I didn't understand how much work went into moving; the emotional work of letting go and the physical energy of packing everything you would take with you.

When we moved from Southside UMC in Jacksonville, Florida, after almost eleven years of ministry, we had a house full of furniture and had collected way too many things. As good-bye parties increased and my free time decreased, we needed help to get everything packed up for the moving van.

The moving deadline drew closer and closer, and we began to panic and got several people to help us pack framed paintings, photographs, mirrors, books, vases and all sorts of things we had accumulated over the years. Instead of being organized, it was more of a mad-dash to the finish line

Everything made it into the truck, except live plants and my propane gas tank. The moving truck was barely able to close its door and off we went to Orlando having no time to inventory our belongings.

We unpacked in Orlando and the months went by. Christmas arrived on schedule but most of our Christmas decorations were still in boxes in the garage. As we began to unpack them and decorate for our first Christmas party, I realized a certain item could not be found.

One particular decoration we loved was a brass rendering of the three wise men. Ramona's aunt and uncle had given it to us and we always enjoyed having the Magi standing near the doorway. We enjoyed celebrating Epiphany after the busyness of December.

For seven years we searched for the missing kings and wondered where they might have gone. No matter how many Christmas boxes we looked in, the Magi were not there. I truly did miss them.

After those seven years I was appointed to serve on the extended cabinet and we began to prepare for our move to Lakeland. It was the first time in 25 years that we were moving as empty nesters. We held an estate sale and sold about two-thirds of our belongings. Being efficient, we successfully downsized.

We lived in two more houses before we landed on the one that felt like home. That home had a beautiful fireplace. We thought that the fireplace needed a mirror hanging over the hearth and I remembered we had one packed away in a box in the closet that had never been opened in nine years. When I began to remove the brown paper wrapping, guess who appeared taped to the back of the mirror but the missing kings!

We cheered! We celebrated! After nearly a decade, our kings had found their way home! (They were actually there all along, just hiding.) It was a great celebration in our new home, especially for Epiphany. The Kings found their way to our front door to welcome all our Christmas and Epiphany visitors.

## "Field and Fountain, Moor and Mountain. Following Yonder Star!"

This Epiphany has been an exciting time to view the Bethlehem Star shining brightly since its last appearance some 800 years ago! My

hope is that this has been a reminder to all of us of God's faithfulness and sovereignty. A Reminder to us all of the power of God's creation. I am reminded of Psalm 8, "O Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens." May you follow his star into this new year with Hope and Perseverance as we make our way into the Light of a New Year!

## January 2021 is National Slavery & Human Trafficking Prevention Month

Did you know that sex and labor trafficking happen right here in North Florida — not just in big cities? Did you know that youth are more vulnerable to human trafficking online, and that this has gotten worse since the pandemic began? Did you know that the private sector: businesses, hotels, restaurants, healthcare and more all have a role to play in ending human trafficking and, do you want to know more?

January 2021 marks National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month and there are many events you can attend to learn about these issues and more. For example, the Rotary Club of Tallahassee and the International Rescue Committee will both feature programs on human trafficking of youth an important topic, especially during this time of COVID-19. Why? Because although staying home is the best way to keep everyone safe, isolation increases vulnerability.

Children may not be attending school, where teachers can observe them, and report suspected abuse or trafficking. Also, many people, especially low-wage earners such as dishwashers, housekeepers, agricultural workers and day laborers, are losing jobs or are being exploited and forced to work in unsafe conditions. The need for all of us to be aware of how to spot both sex and labor trafficking and work together to support survivors and those who are at risk of being trafficked due to economic insecurity is only going to increase in the months ahead.

Both WFSU's "Perspectives" call in radio show and a program on "Human Trafficking and the Law: Looking Through a Wider Lens" feature former Assistant U.S. Attorney Barbara Martinez who will discuss how both the criminal and civil sides of the justice system can be mobilized to bring justice to survivors and hold traffickers accountable for

their crimes. She and others from FSU College of Law will also discuss how the private sector can act to make sure that supply chains do not include goods and services produced by enslaved people. We will also learn more about what the hospitality industry must do to recognize and report trafficking and how we can work and learn from Georgia's antitrafficking efforts.

All of these programs are brought to you free and online from Survive and Thrive Advocacy Center (STAC), the Big Bend Coalition Against Human Trafficking, and the International Rescue Committee (IRC) and we hope you will join us! ### A Special Thank You from the Kearney Center

This holiday season has been extremely different for most of us and this is especially true of the clients and staff at the Kearney Center. Typically, the Kearney Center is full of volunteers making special holiday meals, leading holiday activities, and spreading Christmas cheer to our clients. As the pandemic continued, we realized we would be unable to have volunteers in our kitchen for the rest of the year. Churches also realized they would not be able to host our clients for any special Christmas events, including your church's annual community Christmas meal. Trinity saw the lack of services and asked how they could help provide a special Christmas meal for each of our 400 plus clients. Thanks to you and the funds you provided, we will serve a traditional holiday meal: ham, baked potatoes, honey glazed carrots, cinnamon apples, bread, and dessert. To top it all clients will receive homemade cookies lovingly baked and packaged by members of your congregation.

Your kindness and care this season punctuates a year of support for us, including helping us move people into homes of their own. When I think about the challenges of moving 400 plus clients out of emergency congregate shelter and giving them a safe non-congregate HOME, I don't know how we would have done this work without the support of our community partners like Trinity United Methodist Church. Your congregation has stood beside us to help us cross whatever hurdle we were facing next. Fairly early in the pandemic we learned that we would need to make major changes to the Kearney Center and can only safely move back 185 clients.

Quickly, we began accessing new CARES funding and working to find safe and affordable housing for our clients. Our case management team faced this monumental challenge and recognized our clients would need much more than just a roof over their heads. Our case management team put together a list of "Welcome Home" supplies they would like for clients to have as they moved to their first home since leaving homelessness. Trinity has lovingly wrapped its arms around some of the most vulnerable members in our community by providing sheets, towels, blankets, mops, dishes, and other essentials for having a home. Your gifts say we see you and believe you have value. We will help give you a fresh start.

I am so deeply grateful for Trinity's support. Knowing you believe in the work we are doing and care about the clients we are serving is a huge blessing. Thank you for being the hands and feet of Jesus for the often overlooked and underserved in our community.

### Celebrate Altar Guild

The Altar Guild of Trinity United Methodist Church is a dedicated group of individuals who glorify and beautify the sanctuary weekly with fresh arrangements of flowers and greenery. The congregation is most fortunate to have the wide variety of talent that this 30 member committee lends to the life of the church.

The Guild is characterized by their generosity of spirit. Each week the members beautify the altar with floral arrangements. Many members have planted their own personal gardens with varieties of plants and flowers that can be used in arrangements. Joyfully, they share cuttings from their yards with other altar guild members when the need arises. Among the Guild members there is a real love of their work and they are more than willing to share their talent with others.

Altar Guild encourages all Trinity members who love working with flowers to participate in the life of this committee. We invite anyone who would like to participate to join us. Simply contact one of the 3 chairmen, listed at the end of this article, to indicate your interest. Workshops will be offered to help new members.

Each month, two members of the Guild work together. In some instances, one person works on the mechanics of the arrangements and the other on the design, or both design together. Ferns are placed in the urnsfor the first week of the month, Communion week. The following weeks, the team works together, creatively deciding what containers they will use from the storeroom/sacristy, designing with flowers/branches that are blooming

in Tallahassee. The Guild members carefully choose flowers that make a strong visual statement and are cost effective.

Two of the main responsibilities each year, Christmas and Easter, are the placement of memorial or honorary flower gifts in the sanctuary windows and Altar. Trinity members are encouraged to purchase, throught he church office, poinsettas or lillies to enhance the decoration of the sanctuary during Advent and Lent. Without the purchase of these plants, the Altar Guild is limited in its ability to beautify the sanctuary.

Families and individuals often request altar flowers honoring or memorializing individuals,

celebrations, anniversaries, births or graduations. Requests for such altar arrangements can be made by calling the church office. The cost for this service, which consists of two large arrangements is \$100.00.

The Guild feels it is a privilege to glorify Trinity and God while beautifying the sanctuary. We are a wonderful corps of friends willing to provide time, talent, and most of all, love to and for our church. Won't you please join us?
