

Gun Violence

Research Update: Understanding the Problem

as of February 4, 2022

To understand the local problem of gun violence, CAJM leaders have read articles and reports from local and national experts on gun violence and policing. As of February 4th, we met with the National Network for Safe Communities, Kimball Thomas of the TEMPO program, which works with at-risk and "disconnected" young Black males, and staff from the Sheriff's office about the recent "Anatomy of a Homicide" report. Below is a summary of what we know so far.

- ❖ There have been nearly 300 shootings and 80 shooting deaths in the city of Tallahassee since 2018.²
- Sheriff McNeil's report found that both offenders and victims are typically young men between the ages of 15 - 24 who have a prior record.3
- In addition, local and national experts say that shootings are committed by a relatively small number of young men who tend to run in risky social groups. 4
- Most gun violence homicide offenders committed their first crime around the age of 12 7
- ❖ Last year, of the 112 youth who were eligible for a proven diversion program called civil citations, more than half were arrested by both local law enforcement agencies for non-serious, nonviolent offenses⁵ Most of the eligible children who were arrested were Black. These arrests paint children with a criminal record.
